Women at Yale

A Statistical Profile

1969-1979



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Highlights

In the last decade, women have become a very visible and integral part of Yale University. In 1969, when women were first admitted to Yale College, they constituted 12% of the freshman class; in 1979, they made up 45% of the entering class. Similarly, in the Yale Graduate School, in 1969-70, 28% of the enrolled students were women; in 1978-79, 35% were women. Furthermore, in 1978-79, almost all of the professional schools had enrolled between 30 and 40 percent women.

The number of women holding ladder-track faculty² appointments in the University has increased steadily and has roughly doubled in the last eight years: from 107 women in 1971-72 to 208 women in 1978-79. Similarly, 6.4% of the upper-level managerial staff were women in 1975-76, and in 1978-79, 19.0% were women. While the representation of women has improved in many areas over the last ten years, the University still is attempting

^{1.} This brief statistical summary is not a complete summary, nor does it attempt to interpret all statistical information concerning the representation of women. Rather it organizes a number of existing tables that focus on women faculty, staff and students at Yale and highlights some patterns that have occurred during the last ten years. The reader should bear in mind that there are numerous and sometimes conflicting definitions and categories of faculty, staff and students used by various segments of the University. Although we have tried to indicate our definitions through footnotes, care should be taken in interpreting the tables presented.

to increase the number of women in areas where they are few in numbers.

Students

In 1969, 576 women were admitted to Yale College, as freshmen, sophomores and juniors in the Classes of 1973, 1972, and 1971 respectively.

Until 1972, Yale's policy was to increase gradually the number of women admitted each year as undergraduates. In December, 1972, however, the Yale Corporation decided that students be admitted without regard to sex. By 1978-79, the percentage of women enrolled in Yale College had more than tripled since the first year of coeducation, and in the Class of 1983, women made up 45% of the entering class.

In contrast to Yale College, most of the Yale graduate and professional programs had admitted women well before the last decade. In the Graduate School, for example, women were first admitted for degrees in 1892, and by 1900, Yale had awarded more Ph.D.'s to women than any other university in the United States. In 1969, 28% of the enrolled students in the Graduate School were women, as compared to the 12% who enrolled that year as undergraduates. Over the last ten years, there has been a continued increase of women in the Graduate School. By 1978-79, women made up 35% of the enrolled students.

The number of women graduate students in the science division has remained steady at 20% in the ten-year period. The humanities and social sciences have had substantial increases in the number of women enrolled in their program to the humanities, 34% of those enrolled were women in 1969-70; it rose to 45% in 1978-79. In 1969-70, 19% of those enrolled in the social sciences were women; in 1978-79, the percentage climbed to 32%.

As in the Graduate School, most of the professional schools had admitted women for many years prior to 1969. Since 1971-72, when consistent statistics were first available, most of the professional schools have increased the number of women enrolled. The enrollment of women in the professional schools for 1971 and 1978 can be seen below:

^{1.}In 1979 the School of Forestry and Environmental Studies graduated more women than men for the first time (21 women and 19 men).

^{2.} While the data for the School of Music seem to indicate that the number of women enrolled is dropping, this is not the case. Because the total number of students enrolled in the school is not very large, even small fluctuations in the number of women enrolled creates noticeable changes in the percentages year to year. The percentage of women enrolled in the school in 1979-80 is 46%.



Faculty

The most significant increases in the numbers of women faculty over the past decade have occurred in the Faculty of Arts and Sciences and in the Divinity School. In 1971-72, in the Faculty of Arts and Sciences, 26 (2.1%) women held ladder-track appointments; in 1978-79, the number had increased to 87 (13.8%). In the Divinity School, 2 (6.9%) women held ladder-track appointments in 1971-72; in 1978-79, there were 6 (16.7%) women.

During the past eight years, the number of women in tenured positions university—wide has gone from 6 (1.1%) to 24 (4.0%). But the likelihood of increasing the percentage of tenured women in a significant way decreases as the University makes fewer tenured slots available to departments and schools. Still, in the last two years 18% of the new appointments and promotions to tenured positions have been of women. It is significant that this percentage is slightly higher than the estimation of the availability of women for tenured positions.

University-wide, women have accounted for 28% of the new appointments to ladder-track term positions in the last six years. In 1978-79, 102 of the 366 non-ladder instructional positions were filled by women. The representation of women in the research ranks has remained fairly consistent during the past six years. These positions are found primarily in the School of Medicine and in the science division of the Faculty of Arts and Sciences, where women have occupied between 30% and 37% of the positions during this period.

Although there has been some improvement with respect to the representat: of women in recent years, there still remain segments of the faculty with few

or no women. In many cases these occur in fields which traditionally have been occupied by men and continue to attract very few women or in fields where women have only recently begun to enter in significant numbers so that their numbers continue to be very small in the higher ranks and tenured positions.

Staff

Women have represented roughly 90% of the clerical staff at Yale and have occupied more than half of the total technical jobs during the last ten years. Similarly, about 31% of the service and maintenance positions have been filled by women, but semi-skilled and skilled positions such as electrician, truck driver, and gardener, remain jobs where women are not well represented.

Advances in the percentage of women in managerial jobs in the last decade have occurred. In 1975-76, 6.4% of the upper-level managerial staff were women and 23.4% of the middle-level were women. By 1978-79, women occupied 19.0% of the upper-level managerial positions and 27.4% of the middle-level managerial positions. The high percentage of women occupying middle-level professional staff positions has remained fairly constant over the last several years at about 56%. However, percentages for the upper-level professional positions sometimes have fluctuated in this period, primarily because there are so few upper-level positions and even small changes in the number of women create noticeable changes in the percentages. In 1975-76, 27.1% of the upper-level professional staff were women; in 1978-79, 21.7% were women; and in 1979-80, 30.0% were women.

In the last ten years, some of the upper-level managerial and professional positions filled by women have been: Physical Education (Director), Athletics (Assistant Director), Office of Undergraduate Admissions (Director), University Operations (Assistant to the Director), Undergraduate Financial Aid Office (Director), Budget Office (Director), General Counsel's Office (Associate and Assistant General Counsels), Personnel (Managers), Custodial Services (Manager), and Library (Associate Librarian).

Academic Administrative Appointments of Women

After Yale College became coeducational in 1969, the appointment of women to trusteeships, deanships, and other major academic administrative posts became more frequent. Over the last decade in the residential colleges, eight women have occupied the rank of Dean and four women have headed residential colleges as Master. In 1971-72, for the first time in Yale's history, two women were chosen as members of the Yale Corporation. In 1971-72, for the first time a women was named to fill the post of Associate Provost, and a woman was appointed Assistant Dean in the Yale Law School, making a total of six women in Assistant Dean positions in the University. For several years, women occupied the position of Assistant Dean in Yale College, and in 1973-74, for the first time a women was appointed as Associate Dean in that school. In 1975-76, two major posts in the University were filled by women for the first time: the position of Provost of the Universitiand the position of Associate Dean of the Graduate School. In 1977-78,

Provost Hanna H. Gray became Acting President of the University for twelve months. By 1978-79, a significant number of high ranking administrative appointments were filled by women. They occupied the following positions: two Associate Provosts, three Associate Deans, Dean of the School of Nursing, Associate University Chaplain, and one Master of a Residential College.
